letter from the director

Dear Neighbors,

After a year of growth, we are excited to begin 2024 with the launching of our new strategic plan. The plan was developed through a long process of community and staff engagement and was approved by the Library's Board of Trustees this past December.

In 2023, WPL experienced increases in visits, circulation, and program attendance, by 9%, 20%, and 8%, respectively. Building on this momentum of rising public demand, we will be working to reshape and reinvest in our offerings of collections, programs, and services in the years ahead.

One major goal of the plan places a priority on continual improvement and optimization of the physical layout of our facilities. In 2024, we will study the feasibility of reconfiguring underutilized spaces to better align staff areas while increasing the square footage available for new public uses. Among new public uses under consideration, we will explore more study and small group meeting rooms, spaces for arts and crafts activities, and spaces for other DIY makers and creative work. Additional community input will be solicited in the months ahead. Please stay tuned for further details.

Preparations are also underway for the Library's 100th anniversary, which takes place in January of 2026. In an approach similar to Wadsworth's bicentennial celebrations in 2014, we are actively seeking community members interested in serving on the Library's centennial community planning committee. If you are interested, please contact Deputy Director Nicole Moore at 330.335.2602. We look forward to hearing from you!

This January we launched our first effort to help parents and caregivers regain control of their child's screen time with a special course on parental controls for devices. As the epidemic of screen addiction deepens amid a public conversation about the uses, abuses, and unintended consequences of social media use among youth, Wadsworth Public Library is committed to partnering with our community to provide knowledge, tools, and solutions.

This is just a small sample of the work we plan to accomplish in the years ahead. We invite you to take a moment to read our full strategic plan, available at visit www.wadsworthlibrary.com/plan.

As spring approaches, don't forget to mark your calendar for the Friends Book Sale, April 11 through 14. Funds raised by the Friends of Wadsworth Public Library go to support our popular Summer Reading Club, with program presenters, entertainers, and prizes for patrons of all ages.
