Virtual Adult Storytime

Theme: Artists

The purpose of the Virtual Adult Storytime is to provide older adults in the Wadsworth Community with content to facilitate sharing and reminiscing during a time we cannot meet in person.

Story/ Book/ Folktale (People of all ages benefit from hearing stories read aloud. For older adults it can be a chance to stir memories and use their imagination)

Historic Facts about Art:

- 1. Art was part of the Olympic Games: From 1912 to 1948, art was part of the competitions. Architecture, literature, sculpture, music, and painting were awarded with gold, silver, and bronze medals.
- Egg and Water: During the Middle Ages, the most common technique to create murals was called tempera painting. Tempera is created by mixing dry powdered pigments with egg or water to dissolve them and obtain the vibrant paint used in the religious works.
- 3. Theft of the Mona Lisa: Undoubtedly, *The Mona Lisa* is the most famous painting in the history of the world. The reason behind its popularity resides in the fact that it was masterfully done and its mysterious "disappearance." Da Vinci's painting was stolen from the Louvre Museum in 1911. The thief attempted to return it to the Uffizi Gallery in Florence. The painting has been replicated and sold as the original piece at least 6 times.









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Van Gogh: Starry Night





MASON JAR LID SUNCATCHER CRAFT



Supplies needed:
Mason jar lid
Patterned paper
Colored pencils
Vegetable oil
Cotton ball
Twine
Scissors
Glue

Instructions:

- 1. Print the canning ring art page (attached below)
- 2. Color in design using colored pencils
- 3. Use a cotton ball and a small amount of oil and "paint" over the color
- 4. Let picture dry completely
- 5. Cut out picture to fit the inside ring of canning jar lid, glue if necessary
- 6. Tie twine around outside of lid and cut to length to hang in window
